11. 2016 Chair's report: Please provide a narrative of the past year's activity/successes/challenges:\*

The past year has been outstanding for the section and for the individual officers and leaders within the section. We have held a number of popular events, increased member participation in our section's activities, provided educational and leadership training to our members, sorted out our bylaws, and worked to improve our social media and email presence.

2016 started off strongly as newly elected officers took their positions with enthusiasm and motivation. Our section Chair provided us with a theme for the year of "K through Gray: Chemistry Through the Ages." This theme was agreed upon by all EXCOMM members during our first EXCOMM meeting and was used throughout the year to make decisions about local section directions and plans. The purpose of this theme was to remind us that we aim to include all age groups in our activities and that we should strive to integrate youth with more senior chemists. During the meeting, we also introduced new leaders to our EXCOMM members. These new leaders expanded our capabilities and capacity to perform activities. We introduced a new set of Co-Chairs to run our YCC, a new Chair to revitalize our WCC which had been inactive for many years, a new Education Chair to establish an Education Committee and manage our outreach activities, and a new PR Chair to develop a Committee on Public Relations which we had not previously been formed.

We spent a great deal of time in 2016 focused on outreach to youth as well as to our senior members. For our younger members, we focused on outreach in the form of science fairs, the Atlanta Science Festival and Expo, and setting up new programs like Project MEET for which we received an ACS grant. The Atlanta Science Festival and Expo was a highlight for our section. Our new Education Chair, Sarah Paquette, worked with middle school students from The Woods Acres School to put together a demonstration about the effects of "Miracle Berries" on taste buds. The students then ran our demonstration booth at the festival, which attracts more than 20,000 people of all ages, with very little intervention from adults. The booth was a huge hit and children, and their families, quickly spread the word that our booth should not be missed. The booth was so highly regarded that Ms. Paquette is working with students to put together another booth at the 2017 expo. We also worked to develop a project that will match up young children with senior scientists to conduct computer simulations of basic models in an effort to explain some of the properties of specific chemicals and to post the findings on social media. This project, "Bridging Chemistry with Technology: Motivating Young Students to Learn Chemistry through Technology and Social Media" received software donations from Wavefunction, Inc. and received grant funding from ACS The events associated with this project will be conducted during the spring of 2017. Our outreach to more senior and established local section members occurred through our special October awards ceremony in which we honored our 50 and 60 year ACS members. Awardees were given time to speak to the audience about their experiences in chemistry and to share the lessons they learned. This was a great opportunity not only for our members to share their life story, but also for the audience to learn about the state of science and chemistry decades ago. In addition, we included several other awards for outstanding leadership and volunteerism. It was wonderful to share our accomplishments and efforts with those who helped to form the environment we currently practice

We also included many activities directed at the rest of our membership who are mid-career. These activities included our dinner meetings which were redesigned, in part, based on feedback we received from ACS regarding our 2015 annual report. Our traditional dinner meeting format included a technical talk over dinner. In 2016, we decided to reformat these dinner to make them more interactive and to appeal to a broader population. The result is that our attendance for these dinners increased greatly, sometimes doubling the attendance we saw for an individual meeting in 2015. Some of our most popular meetings include the chemistry of chocolate which was held over dinner, the chemistry of wine which was held at a wine shop with sommeliers who guided us through wine

tastings, and a panel on the Flint, MI water crisis that was led by leaders in environmental chemistry including a lawyér. Feedback from members on these events has been overwhelmingly positive and so we will be utilizing this format for our 2017 meetings. Another highlight from 2016 is the passage of a new set of local section bylaws. Our old bylaws had not been updated since 2005 and were outdated. Despite efforts to generate new bylaws over the past several years, difficulties in obtaining a consensus about what the bylaws should look like hindered any progress. After working with C&B, our Chair provided us with a template for new bylaws. Our officers and councilors worked together over several meetings to fill out this template. The new bylaws were passed by our section members during our November elections and are currently awaiting approval by C&B. In addition to our 50/60 year and service awards ceremony in October, we also held two special awards meetings: the Percy Julian award meeting and the Herty Medalist award meeting. During the Percy Julian award meeting, we recognized two minority high school students for their accomplishments and provided them with student memberships to ACS and small book scholarships for college. This event was hosted by our MAC which was just one of several very successful events they hosted in 2016. In September, we awarded the 82nd Herty Award Medal to Dr. Brooks Pate, the William R. Kenan, Jr. Professor of Chemistry at the University of Virginia. This prestigious award is given once a year to a chemist who has significantly contributed to his or her chosen fields and has provided service in the form of education and outreach to others. Finally, we spent a large amount of effort in 2016 developing mechanisms for reaching out to our members. We reformatted our old PDF-style quaterly Filter Press newsletter into a clickable, professionally-formatted HTML email and began sending the Filter Press out monthly. Our new Public Relations Chair, Antara Dutta who is an Associate Professor of Chemistry at Georgia State University, developed a new Facebook page for our group which has already had more than 5 times more traffic than our previous page. She also developed new Twitter and Instagram pages for us in addition to revitalizing our old, unused LinkedIn page. It will not be possible to discuss all of the other amazing activities and events our section has held over the past year, so we encourage you to read the list of activities we participated in which is attached under supporting material. 12. 2017 Chair's goals for the Section a. 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b. What are your concerns and challenges?*	As I begin my year as Chair of the Georgia Local Section, I have a few concerns and anticipate challenges. As Chair, I will strive to improve communication between leadership and the committees, especially the Younger Chemists Committee, the Women Chemists Committee, and the Minority Affairs Committee. The challenge will be to encourage more of a collaborative tone between the
	Section and these committees vs. the status quo of committees acting as separate entities and reporting back. Another concern is the budget. We have continually been in a deficit to truly support our membership. However, I want to work with the treasurer to reduce or eliminate this trend. With a few tweaks, such as online pre-payment before events and increasing local dues, I know we can accomplish this goal. Another concern is that senior-career professionals could engage and mentor early/mid-career professionals more than they are currently. Early/mid-career professionals should be taking advantage of the resident expertise of senior-career chemists who will be able to remain current and active well after retirement as they mentor. More importantly, in a field where many of us have or are underemployed, senior-career persons can serve as sponsors to help launch careers. Since no one is going to sponsor (or even mentor) someone who has not proven their worth, the challenge will be to create section-based programs that can match more seasoned professionals with younger colleagues and start establishing these relationships. Finally, as Chair-elect last year I diversified not only the speaker pool but also the topics. Our talks became less technical lectures, and increasingly opportunities to engage the local community more. We changed the general tone of events and rebranded ourselves in the Atlanta community. The challenge will be to ensure our new Chair-elect sustains this momentum and continues along this vein.

b. What are your concerns and challenges?*	Regarding the establishment of SEED, finding project SEED mentors and arranging SEED fellows' transportation to the research institution is a major concern. I am also concerned about maintaining member interest and participation in monthly dinner meetings. Finally, I have concern about selection and responsiveness of students for research presentations at dinner meetings. These concerns should be alleviated, in part, by the leadership of the local section who have assured me of their dedication to my goals.

We also established new Instagram and Twitter pages and revitalized our old LinkedIn page that was dormant for many years. We keep information on all social media pages updated and Finally, we continue to use our local section's website (http://georgia.sites.acs.org/) to post information and forms. We utilize email and social media to summarize or highlight information and direct members to our website for complete details. We also archive much of our information on the website. During elections, we do mail out ballots to several members who do not have email addresses on file. The Georgia Local Section has performed above and beyond its standard activity level in 2016. Great effort was put into redevelopment of our monthly dinner program, outreach programs and communication to our members. Historically, our monthly dinner meetings consisted of a technical talk over dinner. While these meetings attracted a core group of members, they alienated others who had no interest in the seminar topic. In 2016, this format was completely remodeled and a new, more engaging and exciting monthly program was developed. We focused on both interesting and general topics and, whenever possible, included interactive activities. For example, we held a "Chemistry of Chocolate" dinner meeting at a local restaurant. The speaker, Clay Berryhill, a Chocolate Making Apprentice at Cacao Atlanta Chocolate, discussed the processes behind choosing cacao beans from around the world, the flavors and notes in chocolate, and the science behind producing a bar of chocolate. This event was our most highly attended dinner event with 79 total attendees representing just over a 192% increase in participation from our 2015 average attendance levels (41 people)! Not only did we reach out to members who normally do not attend our meetings, but we also captured the interest of some members who later assumed project leadership roles in our section. We held similarly successful dinner meetings including an interactive wine tasting event titled "The Chemistry of Wine" which included wine tastings and had 70 total attendees representing a

170% increase over the average attendance from last year's dinner meetings, and our hot topic panel on Water Contamination in Flint, MI which was attended by 58 people representing a greater than 140% increase in participation from 2015.

Overall, 423 participants attended 9 dinner meetings in 2016 compared to just 374 participants over 9 dinner meetings in 2015. The increase of almost 50 additional participants in 2016 was due to the reformatting of the meetings and, in part, to increased communications to members. We spent a great deal of effort reformatting our quarterly newsletter, which was only ever posted on our website. The newly formatted newsletter is now delivered monthly to our members by email and contains summaries of dinner meetings, information about upcoming meetings, and committee information. The new, attractive email design was adapted from the templates used by technical divisions. By switching from our old listserv to RealMagnet, we have more control over these postings and have been able to utilize the metrics tools to identify which links have been clicked and how often the emails are being viewed.

In hand with the newly-developed email newsletter, we have increased our social media presence. Our new Facebook page has at least four times more reach than our older page. We also now have Twitter, LinkedIn, and Instagram pages for communicating to members. We have worked hard to boost traffic on our Facebook page by holding 3 random drawings for our visitors in which we gave out 6 ACS-related prizes. We have seen that this activity increases our interactions with Facebook friends.

The improvements we've made to our section over the past year have resulted in increased member participation in events, increased assumption of leadership roles, increased capacity to participate in outreach activities, and increased recognition and support by industry. We look forward to continuing on this path in 2017!
